

Best Breakfast

GRAND HYATT MELBOURNE, VIC

Breakfast is definitely the most important meal of the day at Melbourne's Grand Hyatt, less a cook-by-numbers morning smorgasbord than a bustling hawker kitchen. Best Pool

SOUL SURFERS PARADISE, QI

Tough call, this one, but Soul triumphs with its trio of pools dedicated to guest pleasure. The sexily tiered 25-metre outdoor pool with sweeping Surfers views is a knockout, but there's also a 25-metre heated lap pool indoors and a wading one for little swimmers.

Best Bar

HOTEL HOTEL, CANBERRA, ACT

At last, a hotel with a real bar. Not some throwback vision of what a hotel bar ought to be, but a destination drinking hole to lure guests and visitors alike. Monster Kitchen and Bar has a notable emphasis on regional wines, terrific cocktails and memorable food. The toast of the town.

Best Club Sandwich

THE LANGHAM SYDNEY, NSW

Of the 50 club sandwiches we road-rested, the standout was a classic with a gentle twist. Curried egg is teamed with leg ham and house-smoked chicken. Served between six white toast triangles with lettuce and cucumber, it came with a bowl of hand-cut chips and pot of aĭoli. A sure winner.

Best Minibar

MONA PAVILIONS, HOBART, TAS

Okay, so it's more maxi than mini but we wish more hotels offered liquor cabinets such as those at MONA Pavilions. Each in-room cellar features a 30-bottle selection ranging from local heroes to French legends Alphonse Mellot and Pol Roger. Extra marks for the Aesop toiletries and vagina-shaped soaps. mona.net.au

Innovation of the Year

NEXT HOTEL BRISBANE, OLD

We're torn between one hotel and two great ideas. At Next, we were mightily impressed by the 24/7 guest access to sleep pods, showers, pool, snacks, gym and business centre, even before check-in and after check-out. And we reckon its smart-phone-controlled rooms are the shape of things to come in the hotel world. At Next, the future is now.





HOTEL HOTEL

The Nishi building, with its eclectic façade of timber, glass and concrete, has become an instant landmark in this hip part of central Canberra - not least because it houses the very hip Hotel Hotel. The grand staircase of salvaged timber makes a striking entrance to this temple of sustainability, but the hotel doesn't wear its green credentials on a hairshirt sleeve. Instead you find a singular gathering of environmentally friendly yet elegant design, bespoke furnishings, artworks and objets trouvés, all fashioned by local artists and makers. Meals are served in the lobby bar at geometric dining tables, while banquette seating and sofa huddles suit the cocktail crowd. Streamlined rooms feature clay-rendered walls and contoured cabinetry, as well as tech-savvy touches such as iPads containing guest info, and super switches for lights and block-out blinds. The bathrooms with walk-in showers have heated floors - heaven - and the grey linen robes are possibly the finest we've seen. Each room has a unique mix of furniture, perhaps restored mid-century pieces. and original artworks. Did we mention the staff? Urbane and friendly as befits this most chic boutique hotel.

We love What don't we love? From the one-of-a-kind entranceway constructed of suspended planks of reclaimed fimber to the unique artworks in public spaces and rooms, this place speaks of creativity and considered detail at every turn.

Thoughtful extrust The umbrella and carry-bag in the room are welcome touches for travellers who pack light. Complimentary yoga on Saturday and Wednesday mornings also ficks the box. And free bikes make for a breezy trip to galleries via the lake.

Eating in Arguably Canberra's best eating is right here in the lobby. Sean McConnell's Monster Kitchen and Bar dishes out the good stuff from 6:30am to lam. At breakfast, it's trout hash browns with fried eggs and herb salad or house-made crumpets with the hotel's own honey. At dinner, there's mahi mahi with jamón serrano and sweetcorn, or have the extraordinary yabby jaffles sent to your room.

Scepping out You're at the epicentre of capital cool here in New Acton. Take a stroll through the precinct over the road, where you'll find cafés, bars and restaurants and A Baker, which neatly combines all three under one roof, as well as sculptures by local artists.

Drink up Minibars are streamlined but considered: Nick O'Leary's Canberra-district wines, The Apple Thief Pink Lady Cider, Oracle Cloudy Apple Juice, with Thomas Chipman organic chips, fancy nuts and A Baker coffee. Monster's cocktails include spirits such as Tasmania's 666 vodka and Margaret River's West Winds gin, in classics and "seasonal" creations such as the Noir Negroni made with cold-drip coffee and grapefruit.
